
EVENT CALENDAR

RHEINMAINCARD

Visit the region outside Frankfurt as well. With the RheinMainCard, you can also travel there free of charge on local public transport and receive attractive discounts.





This way:

- Frankfurt airport to main train station: From the regional train station in Terminal 1, take lines S8, S9, RE2 or RE3 at platform 1 in the direction of the main train station.
- Tram: Continue in 5 minutes with tram 11 and 14 leaving directly in front of the main station to the city centre, Destination: **Römer/Paulskirche**
- There are five must-sees within a 5-minute walk: the Römer, the cathedral, the New Old Town, St Paul's Church and Goethe House.
- A few steps further and you'll reach the banks of the Main with cafés and fantastic skyline views.

Tip: Boats depart from the Iron Bridge ("Eiserner Steg") for round trips (1 hour).

- There is a large selection of restaurants and cafés around the Römerberg. Whether you fancy international dishes, typical Frankfurt cuisine or delicious coffee specialities.
- By foot: If you walk along Kaiserstraße, you will reach Gallusanlage with a view of the skyline. Continue walking straight ahead to cross Roßmarkt and Zeil or turn right to the Mainufer and stroll along the Main to the Eiserner Steg and Römerberg.

Boat trip: See Frankfurt from a different perspective. A boat trip down and up the Main is possible from the Eiserner Steg. More information: Primus Linie oder KD Deutsche Rheinschifffahrt.

Mainufer: Relax on the banks of the Main on one of the gastronomy boats or simply on the lawn with a cool drink and a view of the passing boats and the skyline.

Rooftop-Bars: What could be better than marvelling at Frankfurt's skyline panorama over a sundowner? Our tip: one of the numerous rooftop bars, such as the NFT Skybar (Germany's highest rooftop bar) or the Gatsby-style Blasky Rooftop Bar.

Frankfurt's smallest district with its idyllic location on the Main is a centre of attraction for everyone: residents, citizens and guests from all over the world meet here for a coffee, visit the numerous museums and individual shops and enjoy the old town flair in the heart of the Main metropolis.

Our tip:

Try the delicious Frankfurter Kranz in the Café "Haus zur Goldenen Waage" - one of the most beautiful half-timbered houses among the buildings in the New Old Town.

Shopping-Paradise



Shopping lovers will feel right at home in Frankfurt's city centre. On the Zeil you will find international labels and department store chains. Goethestraße is recommended for an exclusive shopping experience. Small cafés and individual boutiques are hidden away in the side streets.

Unusual and individual

When strolling through the **districts** away from the mainstream, Frankfurt offers numerous individual boutiques with their own fashion and design labels. The "Berger" in the Nordend district is considered Frankfurt's longest shopping street with many ownermanaged shops.

You will find another small, but fine fashion scene neighbourhood around Brückenstraße. Young designer showrooms and smaller boutiques have set up shop here, offering a special selection of pieces for the fashion-conscious.









Frankfurt is a green city at heart, with numerous parks and green spaces to relax in.

Palmengarten: Fancy a trip to the desert, a jungle tour or a journey through a mangrove forest? Go on a botanical journey around the world with ease and take a walk through the earth's climate zones. Here, everything the world of flora has to offer grows and proliferates in the open air and in various greenhouses.

Lohrberg: If you want a great view over the city and still be surrounded by greenery, the Lohrberg is the place to be. The only vineyard within the city limits not only offers a great view over the city, but also invites you to linger in the restaurants on the hill.

Bethmannpark & Chinese garden: With its diverse floral splendour and lush flowerbeds, Bethmannpark is more like a small spa park. The Chinese garden, with its pond, small bridge and a stepped portal decorated with dragons, is a real gem and was created according to the classic design principles of the Feng Shui theory of harmony. The ambience invites you to meditate!

Frankfurt like a local

Frankfurt "water houses"

Almost nothing says "like a local" in Frankfurt like a visit to a Wasserhäuschen ("water house"). At "Fein", guests sit on old chairs, sofas and armchairs and enjoy a midday coffee or a beer after work.

Kleinmarkthalle (market hall)

From Monday to Saturday, all kinds of fresh regional and international foods are on sale here. It is particularly popular with Frankfurters on Saturdays to toast the weekend.

Weekly markets

Frankfurt's weekly markets take place at least once a week in many neighbourhoods. Here you can buy fresh fruit and vegetables, meat and fish, cheese, flowers and much more. The farmers' and producers' market at Konstablerwache, which takes place every Thursday and Saturday, is particularly popular for shopping, strolling and feasting.







Frankfurt Green Sauce

Whenever the words "green" and "Frankfurt" are mentioned in the same sentence, don't forget Frankfurt Green Sauce! According to legends, it was Goethe's favorite dish. It is made from 7 herbs and is eaten with potatoes and a choice of egg or boiled beef.





39 museums, endless discoveries on the museum embankment! In addition to the masterpieces of past centuries and contemporary art, they also show the development of communication, the world of design and the fascinating history of film.

No fewer than 26 museums, including the famous Städel Museum, are presented side by side in a prime location directly on the southern bank of the Main, some of them in historic villas. Our tip: get the Frankfurt Card for discounts of up to 50 %!





A second cultural centre with numerous galleries has developed around the New Old town (Fahrgasse and Braubachstraße). Just a few steps away from each other, they offer a wide variety of insights into a broad spectrum ranging from current contemporary art to classical modernism.

Round off your visit in a museum café: Under shady trees in the small park of the Liebieghaus, on the large terrace of the Flowdeli in the Jewish Museum or in the Badias Schirn Café with a view of the New Old Town.

Active and healthy: Cycle along the MainRadWeg (cycle path), explore the Kühkopf nature reserve in the district of Groß-Gerau or relax at one of the many swimming pools and **bathing lakes**, e.g. in the district of Offenbach.

Culinary delights and enjoyment: Sample excellent wines at the wineries in the Main-Taunus district, sayour freshly tapped beer in the half-timbered town of Seligenstadt or enjoy regional delicacies such as Frankfurt's apple wine.

Art and culture: Follow in the footsteps of the Celts on the Glauberg, discover palaces, castles and small historic old towns such as Aschaffenburg or marvel at the UNESCO World Heritage Site of the Mathildenhöhe ensemble in Darmstadt.
